On March 11, our volunteer crew at Parklands Care Center arrived for the usual Wednesday visit. The main difference from the week before was a new log book, with questions for each visitor about recent travel and any current symptoms. Aside from that, and extra hand sanitizer stations, everything seemed normal.

The week before, we had sent an email to our volunteers, letting them know it was fine to stop visiting until the coronavirus situation passed. We asked those who did choose to continue to be extra careful about handwashing, and to please stay home if they had any doubts about symptoms or exposure. So we were not sure who would be there, but about two-thirds of our normal group did choose to attend.

On the second Wednesday of the month, we usually do a little poker game with the residents (no real money involved!). The weather was nice that day, and we felt safer in the open air, so we decided to gather on the back porch of the facility. Everyone seemed to enjoy the game, but especially Ms. Eliza, who seemed much more engaged and alert than usual. She was one of the very first residents Steve and I met when we started 21 years ago, and we were so pleased when she won! (Thank you to volunteer John Hobbs for assisting her.)

After the poker game, we went around for some individual visits. I checked in on my friend Ms. Audrey, and was pleased to see her, since she'd been away at

the doctor's the week before. Unfortunately, I had forgotten the Girl Scout cookies I had promised her, but assured her I would bring them next week.

Sadly, there was not to be a visit the next week. The following day we learned that all of the facilities we serve were no longer allowing visitors, not even family. (However, I was still able to drop off the Girl Scout cookies to Ms. Audrey—after wiping the box with alcohol.)

We miss our friends at the nursing home so very much. We have been doing our best to find ways to reach out to them during this time of quarantine (see related story), but it is definitely not the same. We hope they know how much they are loved, and how we can't wait to come back and visit—and maybe see if Ms. Eliza can defend her championship trophy.

In the meantime, we will never forget her smile, or the smiles of all of our friends at the nursing home. This experience has reminded us more than ever to cherish every visit, for we never know when it will be the last.


